Cover: Keio Unicorns

The two gargoyle-like creatures with single horns that appear on the front cover are known as the Keio Unicorns. They were actual statues that resided on Keio's Mita Campus in the first half of the 20th century. The original sculptures were damaged during the war, but one was repaired and the other was replicated, and the pair now stand watch at the entrance of a Keio-affiliated junior high school.

About Keio University

Keio University has its headquarters in Mita area of Tokyo, one of the world's largest cities with a population of around 14 million people in an area of 2,188 km².

There are 6 main campuses, of which Mita, Shinanomachi, and Shiba-Kyoritsu are located in Tokyo while Hiyoshi, Yagami, and Shonan Fujisawa are located in the adjacent Kanagawa Prefecture (refer to pages 3–4).

Keio University was founded in 1858 during the Edo period, before the modernization of Japan when the influence of the feudal system still remained strong.

Founder Yukichi Fukuzawa believed that for Japan to protect itself from Western powers, it was important to modernize not only the nation's system but also the way its people think, which led him to establish a private school.

Keio University went on to produce many of Japan's industrial leaders, and true to this tradition, many of its graduates are still playing active, leading roles in industry today.

Today, Keio University is a large university with 10 undergraduate faculties, 14 graduate schools, and approximately 33,000 students. Although research universities around the world usually have high output in the sciences, Keio University is characterized by its high output of research in the humanities and social sciences. However, it is also a comprehensive university with a leading university hospital that enjoys a high reputation in Japan and provides highly advanced medical care.

The strong network among the 390,000 alumni is one of Keio University's most valuable assets. Today, thought leaders in a variety of fields are making their presence felt both domestically and internationally, not only in industry, but also in medical care, the legal profession, education, science, politics, the arts, culture, and sports.

Campuses

In addition to the 6 main campuses, Keio University has 9 affiliated schools providing elementary through secondary education in the Greater Tokyo Area. Keio has also established the Keio Academy of New York, a high school accredited in both the United States and Japan.

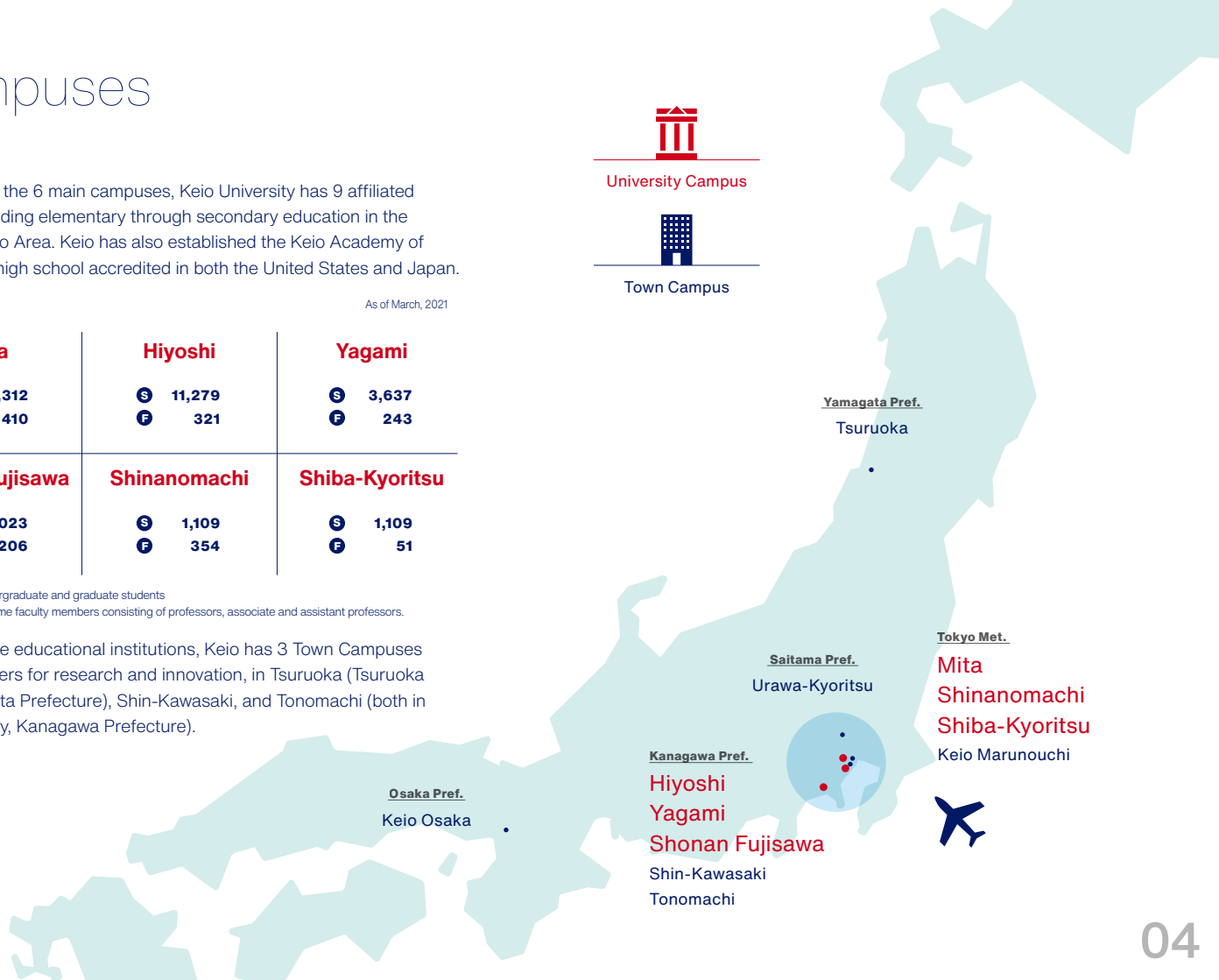

Besides these educational institutions, Keio has 3 Town Campuses that are centers for research and innovation, in Tsuruoka (Tsuruoka City, Yamagata Prefecture), Shin-Kawasaki, and Tonomachi (both in Kawasaki City, Kanagawa Prefecture).



Programs and Courses

As a comprehensive university, Keio University has 14 graduate schools and 10 undergraduate faculties.

At the Graduate Schools of Economics, Medicine, Science and Technology, Media Design, System Design and Management, and the Law School, there are programs that enable students to obtain a degree through courses taught exclusively in English.

At the undergraduate level, there are degree programs that are taught in English: PEARL*¹ at the Faculty of Economics, and GIGA*² offered jointly by the Faculty of Policy Management and Faculty of Environment and Information Studies.

Students and Staff

There are about 33,000 students at Keio University. Around 85% are undergraduate students, and of these, approximately 75% are studying for degrees in the humanities and social sciences. Additionally, about 60% of graduate students are studying for degrees in the natural sciences, technology, and medicine.

There are about 1,900 international students from 73 countries and regions at Keio. In addition to regular degree programs, international students study through exchange programs, the Japanese Language Program, short-term programs, and research programs.



Keio has 2,743 faculty members, 3,009 administrative staff members, and 1,920 medical staff* (doctors and nurses) (as of March, 2021).

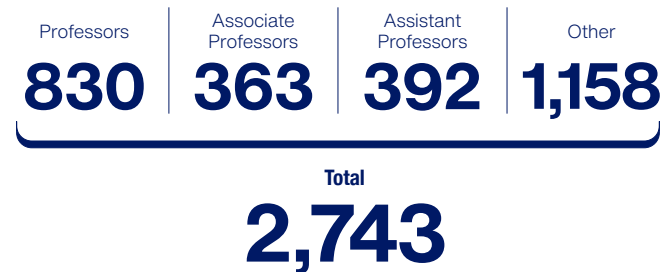

Top Global University Project

In 2014, The Ministry of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology began the 10-year “Top Global University Project”. This project promotes the internationalization of higher education by supporting new initiatives, interactions, and partnerships among the world’s top universities.

Keio University was selected as a Type A University, one of the top 13 universities that conduct world-leading education and research in Japan.

Keio adopted the conceptual theme of “Enhancing Sustainability of Global Society Through Jitsugaku (Science).” By prioritizing the three initiatives of Longevity, Security, and Creativity through international joint research, educational programs, and academic exchange, Keio university is working to solve complex problems to realize a sustainable society.

Keio also established the Keio University Global Research Institute (KGRI) in November 2016. It is a core education and research center to carry out cross-disciplinary research under the three initiatives.

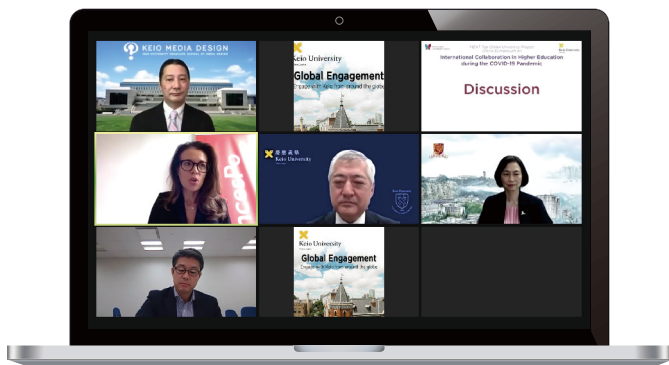

Online Student Exchange

Understanding Japanese and Chinese Culture

Keio University offered a week-long lecture series for students at Keio and Fudan University in China, a long-time exchange partner, titled “Understanding Japanese and Chinese Culture”. Over the course of the 10 lectures, there were 954 students who signed up with close to a 50/50 ratio of participants from Keio and Fudan.



Keio Short-Term Japanese Studies Program

KJSP

The Keio Short-Term Japanese Studies Program (KJSP) 2021 was held online with 21 students taking part — 7 from Keio and 14 students from universities in Canada, Chile, China, France, Germany, Hong Kong, Panama, and Thailand. The KJSP is a two-week intensive program for both international and Keio students (undergraduate and graduate level) to learn collaboratively about Japan.

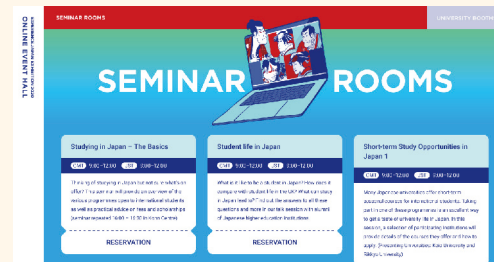
Experience Japan Exhibition

In November 2020, Keio University hosted the "Experience Japan Exhibition 2020 Online." This study abroad fair has been held in London, England every year since 2011. However, for the event's 10th anniversary, it was held online for the first time due to the impact of COVID-19. As a result, a total of 1,353 people were able to attend from various countries around the world.

During the exhibition, approximately 20 institutions, including Keio University and other Japanese universities, Japanese language schools, and the Embassy of Japan in the UK exhibited at virtual booths while providing private consultations for participants. Each university also conducted information sessions to present their respective study abroad programs. Meanwhile, seminars introducing basic information on studying in Japan, JSPS research grant programs, information on JASSO scholarships, employment opportunities in Japan, and panels of students relating their experiences of studying in Japan, were offered in the online event halls.

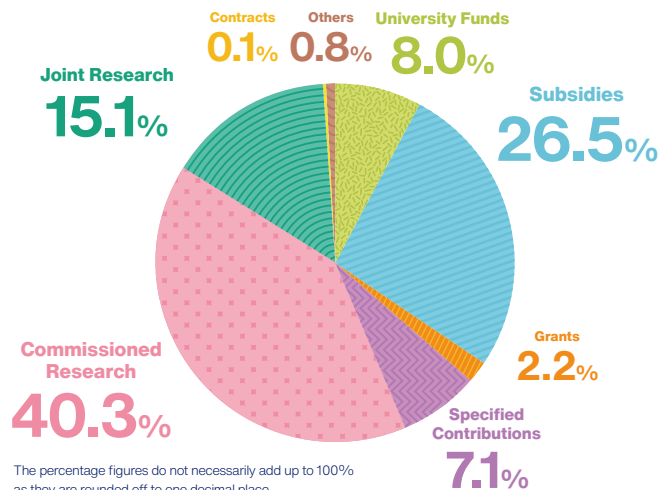

In FY 2020, Keio University received 3.6 billion yen (32 million dollars)* in Grants-in-Aid for Scientific Research—the largest competitive research fund provided by the Japan Society for the Promotion of Science (JSPS)—the highest amount received by a private university and 10th highest in Japan overall.

In FY 2019, Keio University received 6.2 billion yen (59 million dollars)* in research funds from private corporations.

Highly Cited Researchers

Four faculty members of the School of Medicine—Professor Kenya Honda, Associate Professor Koji Atarashi, Assistant Professor Takeshi Tanoue, and Professor Toshiro Sato—were selected as Highly Cited Researchers by Clarivate Analytics in November 2020. This is a recognition of outstanding researchers in 21 scientific categories who have published multiple papers which rank in the top 1% by citations. Out of 6,167 worldwide researchers, 90 were selected from Japan.



COVID-19 Related Research

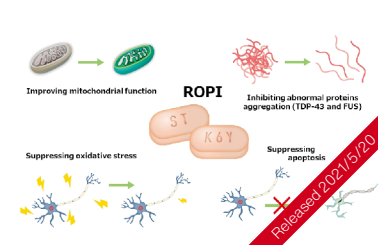
In May of 2020, Keio University, Tokyo Medical and Dental University, Osaka University, Tokyo University's Institute of Medical Science, Kitasato University, Kyoto University, and the Japan Agency for Medical Research and Development (AMED), assembled a team of experts in the diverse fields of infectious diseases, virology, molecular genetics, genome medicine, computational science, and statistical genetics to form the "Joint Research Coronavirus Task Force." This taskforce is the largest contributor in Asia to the world's most extensive analysis of genome-wide determinants for COVID-19 run by the COVID-19 Host Genetics Initiative, an ongoing international collaborative research group. The World-First Calculation of the Excited States of OLED Materials on Quantum Computers

The IBM Quantum Network Hub, a part of the Keio University Quantum Computing Center, in a collaborative effort with Mitsubishi Chemical, IBM Japan, and the JSR Corporation, has achieved the world's first calculation of excited states of commercial materials using quantum computing technology. This is expected to contribute to the development of more efficient luminescent materials as computational capacities evolve in step with the ability to perform more precise calculations than were previously possible.



Potential New Drug Identified for Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS)



Jin Nakahara, Director of the Keio University Hospital Department of Neurology, and Professor Hideyuki Okano's research group from the School of Medicine's Department of Physiology conducted physician-led clinical trials

involving the administration of ropinirole hydrochloride to Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS) patients. The trials showed the drug, which is also used as a treatment for Parkinson's disease, to be both a safe and effective treatment for ALS patients.

The Social in Psychiatries: Depression in Myanmar, China, and Japan

Professor Junko Kitanaka of Faculty of Letters is a participating researcher in the "Global Social Medicine Network," which uses psychiatry, sociology, and other fields to study medicine from a social perspective. An article co-authored by Professor Kitanaka was included in The Lancet medical journal as part of this project, which examines how social, governmental, and cultural backgrounds inform a society's understanding of depression, comparing case studies from the three countries of Myanmar, China, and Japan.



Governmental Policy Evaluation Based on the Japan Child Panel Survey (JCPS)

A research team led by Associate Professor Michio Naoi, and Professor Hideo Akabayashi of Faculty of Economics have completed a study using the "Japan Child Panel Survey (JCPS)" and other sources to evaluate whether fluctuations in household income caused by adjustments to child-support allowances affected educational expenditures or influenced a child's academic abilities. The study concluded that, while raising child-support allowances did influence the amount that families spent on education, there was no proof that it directly improved academic abilities.



SDGs at Keio

Keio University has fostered multiple efforts to realize the United Nation's Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). These include the Keio xSDG Laboratory which conducts research related to and utilizing the SDGs; the Office of Community and Regional Affairs which cooperates with the local community; and the Office for Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion which strives to realize a campus where everyone can learn and work to achieve their full potential.

Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion Initiatives



In September 2019, Keio University established the Keio University Charter for the Promotion of Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion to realize a collaborative society in which people recognize diverse values, give equal respect to the dignity of oneself and others, and endeavor to cooperate with one another.

Under the leadership of the university's president, Keio is promoting gender diversity initiatives on its campuses and joined the "30% Club" in December 2019.

In January 2020, the university launched the Keio Infant Daycare Support (KIDS) program to assist faculty and staff members with childcare.

Through this program, Keio promotes childcare support by providing financial assistance for daycare when academic conferences are held on campus or classes are held on holidays. The program has also set up a dedicated childcare support desk for faculty and staff members.

Hosting Pre-Games Training Camps for Team GB and ParalympicsGB

Keio's Hiyoshi Campus hosted preparation camps for the British Olympic and Paralympic delegations, with Team GB training from July 8 to August 7, and ParalympicsGB training from August 13 to September 2. These were some of the largest preparation camps for an international team provided in Japan.

Students, staff, and faculty members, some of whom were medical professionals, supported the teams during the training camps despite the added hurdles of the COVID-19 pandemic. In thanks, Team GB donated training equipment to the university as a legacy of the Games. The Olympics also provided opportunities for online intercultural exchanges between athletes and Keio students.

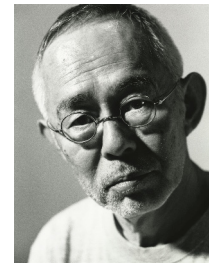

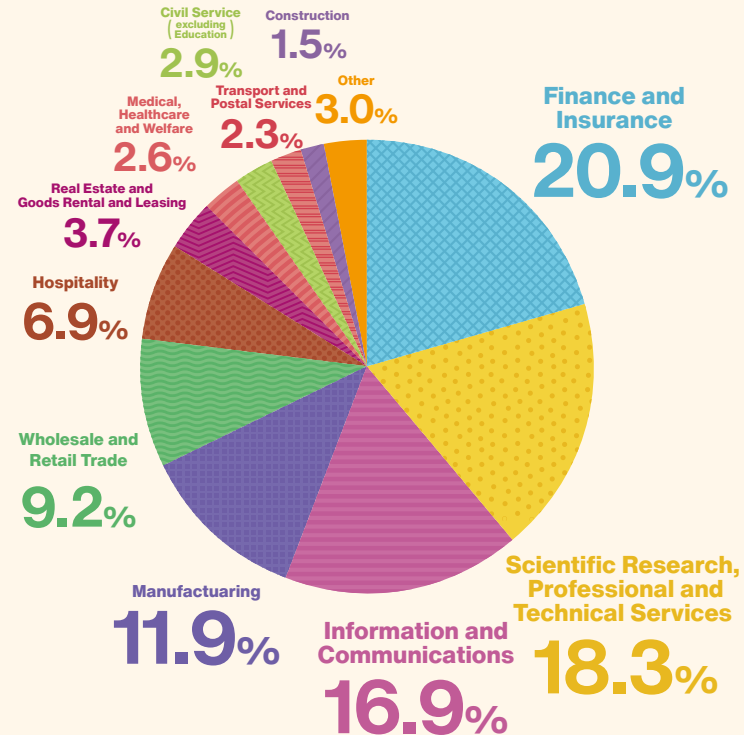


Career Capability

To date, Keio has produced a great number of professionals such as lawyers, certified public accountants, and doctors working throughout Japan. In 2020, the university was ranked first in Japan for the 46th consecutive year in number of people who passed the certified public accountant (CPA) examination. In 2021, Keio also ranked first in Japan for the number of those who passed the bar examination in addition to the CPA.

Finance

For the year ending on March 31, 2021, Keio had an annual revenue of about 170 billion yen.

Of the total revenue, about one-third comes from tuition and other fees, another third from medical services, and the remaining from government subsidies, gifts and donations, investments, etc. Keio has a scholarship fund of about 24 billion yen.

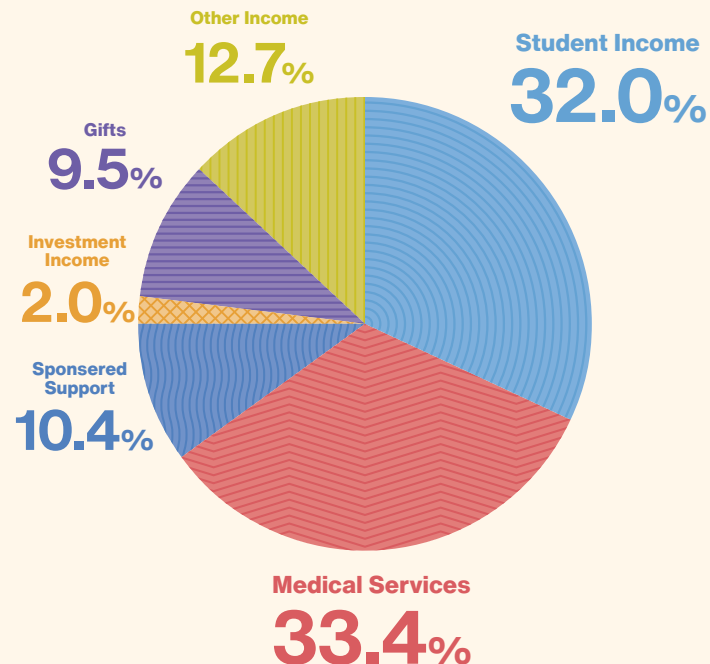
