Introduction to Art Archive XXVIII: In the Shadows: The Obscure
World of Tatsumi Hijikata's Choreography
(January 19–March 14, 2026)

To commemorate the 40th anniversary of the passing of Butoh founder Hijikata Tatsumi, this exhibition is focused on the theme of “Butoh-fu,” Hijikata’s unique method of scoring or notating Butoh performances and showcases never-before-seen materials and footages. Through the notes of his disciples and video recordings of performances, this exhibition reflects on the passing down of Butoh to future generations. By presenting these materials alongside related programs such as performances and screenings, it provides a platform for introducing the concept of an “Movement Archive” in Japan and abroad.

2. Exhibition Overview

Even though Hijikata Tatsumi’s career in Butoh lasted less than thirty years, it is nevertheless difficult to fully grasp the entirety of his work since *Forbidden Colors* in 1959. Within this complex legacy, it is clear that Hijikata made a conscious choice to push the boundaries of his Butoh performances after 1970. While the 1960s was one of the peaks of the Butoh Movement, Hijikata went his separate way from those who had also played key roles in this time, intent upon creating yet newer forms of Butoh. While Hijikata himself was taken aback when he left the stage in 1973, he went on to develop the “Butoh-fu” as a method of choreographing Butoh. This exhibition traces movements born of ghosts and shadows, drawing on new international perspectives and experimental approaches to moving images to present and reconsider Hijikata Tatsumi’s

method, grounded in his Butoh-fu. The exhibition will provide a half-century overview of Hijikata's creative activities since 1976 and will introduce three works in particular: Moe Yamamoto's *Costume In Front: A Model of Darkness for Boys and Girls*, Butoh Performance by Kobayashi Saga: *Bitter Light*, and Butoh Performance by Nimura Momoko: Celebrating the Establishment of Asbestos Hall's Matsushiro Branch *First Flower*.

3. Artist Bio

Hijikata Tatsumi (1928–1986)

Known today as the founder of *Ankoku Butoh* (Dance of Darkness), Hijikata Tatsumi was born in Akita Prefecture. After performing *Forbidden Colors* in 1959, he directed, choreographed, and performed in *Hijikata Tatsumi and the Japanese: Rebellion of the Body* in 1968. This stage was filled with violence, eroticism, and humor, sublimating even to sanctity. In 1972, he directed, choreographed, and performed in Paragon of Sacrificing Great Dance, Performance to Commemorate the Second Unity of the School of Dance of Utter Darkness: *Twenty-seven Nights for Four Seasons*. This body of work synthesized themes and content reflecting his return to Tohoku (Northern part of Japan) since Hosoe Eikoh's photo book *Kamaitachi* and was called "Tohoku Kabuki." These performances were attended by over 8,500 people, making it a monumental moment in Butoh history. Renowned internationally, Hijikata Tatsumi was a Butoh performer celebrated by many authors such as Mishima Yukio and Shibusawa Tatsuhiko, a subject of photographers including Hosoe Eikoh and Klein William, an actor on stages directed by Terayama Shūji, and a collaborator with leading artists across a wide variety of disciplines.

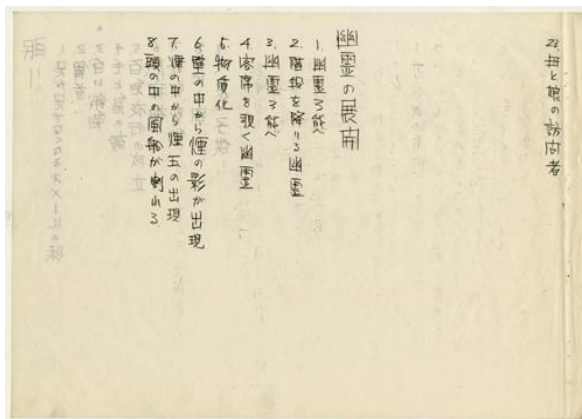
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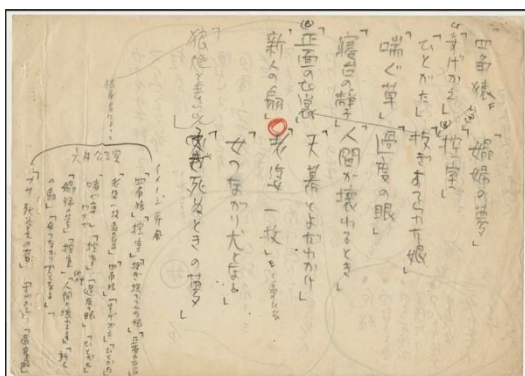

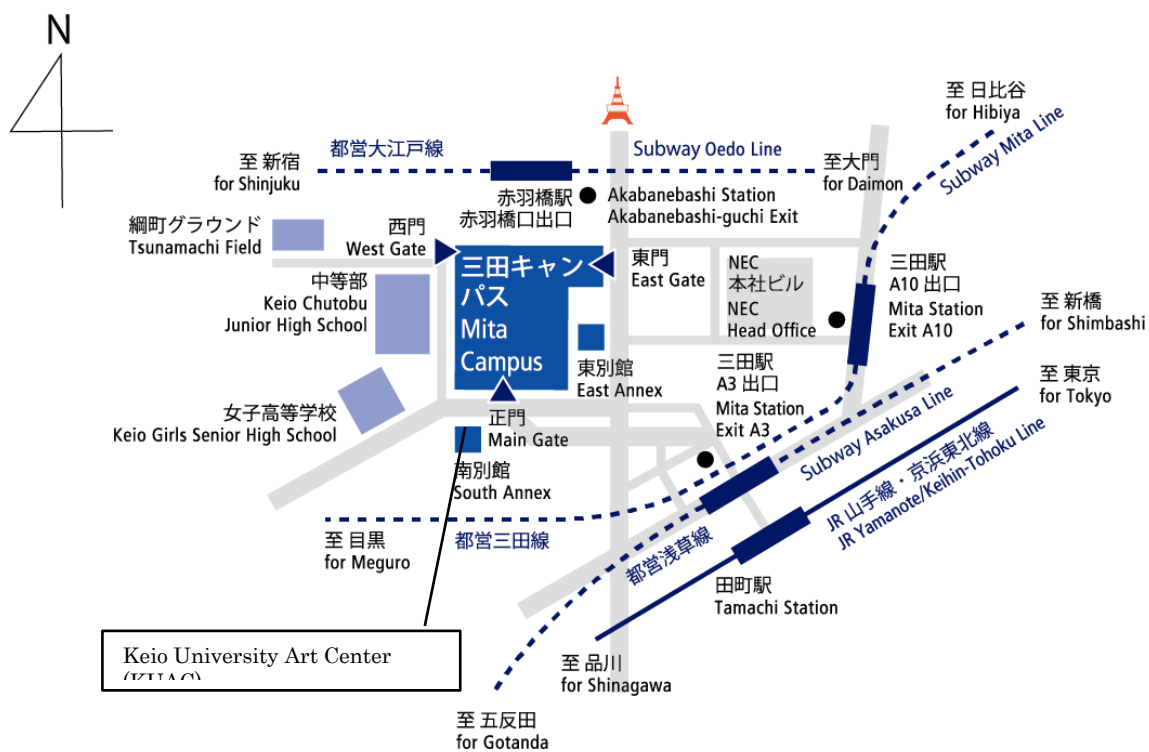
