All exchange students can choose **courses among all study programs** offered at the University of Stuttgart. The following tips should support you in how to find information about courses you are planning to take during your exchange period at the University of Stuttgart via our **course portal C@MPUS**.

English Course Overview

This overview can serve as a starting point to help you explore our available course offerings in English: [Course-Overview_UStuttgart.xlsx](#). The list includes **regularly offered one-semester** courses from different faculties. Please note that the overview does not include complete listings of Architecture Design Studios and Seminars, English-taught [Master's programs](#), language courses, or Key Qualifications (SQ & FÜSQ). For these areas, you can use the general search via C@MPUS as outlined below or have a look at the respective university websites.

Module and course information

All courses offered at the University of Stuttgart are listed on the online platform [C@MPUS](#). The portal provides you with course descriptions including ECTS points, language of instruction, and course schedule.

Modules: Studies are organized in **modules**. A module is **an umbrella term** for different courses/lectures, workshops, laboratories, exercises, etc. that have a common subject and come as a package in the curriculum of regular students at the University of Stuttgart.
To receive the whole number of credits at the end, students must participate in all the offered teaching typologies belonging to the module.

Please note: the **final course catalogues** (e.g., with the courses' schedule and locations) will be **published in February/March** for the following summer semester and **in August/September** for the following winter semester.

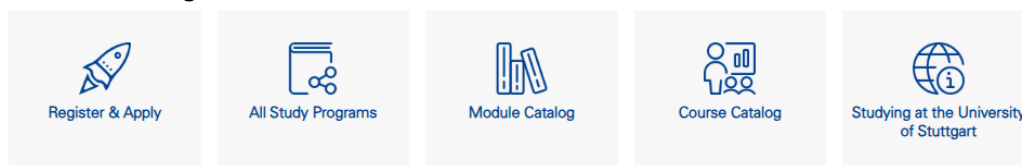
👉 **Tip:** Refer to the course offer of the **summer or winter semester** of the **previous academic year!**

Example: Interested in courses of the winter semester 2026/27? Look for courses that have been offered in the winter semester 2025/26!

If necessary, the language can be changed to German in the top right corner. Choose either the house icon next to the login button on the top of the left side, or the “continue without login” button on the right side. You will come to a page with these five categories:



“All Study Programs”

There are **two ways we recommend** finding courses for your exchange semester: The first way is through the category “**All Study Programs**” (“Studienangebot”). You see a list of all Bachelor’s and Master’s programs offered at the University of Stuttgart. Select the program you are interested in. You may start with the category “**96 Exchange program**”, but you may also try the regular Bachelor’s and Master’s programs.

The first level is the module, indicated with an **orange six-pointed star** ★. Clicking the “+” symbol, you will find the courses included in the module. The **green dot** ● is the **exam** (“Prüfung”) The **red triangle** ▲ indicates the **course/courses** (“Lehrveranstaltung”):

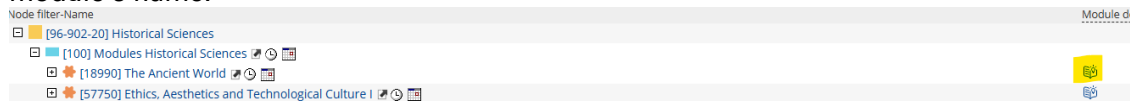

In the module list (orange six-pointed star), click on the little book symbol near the module's name:



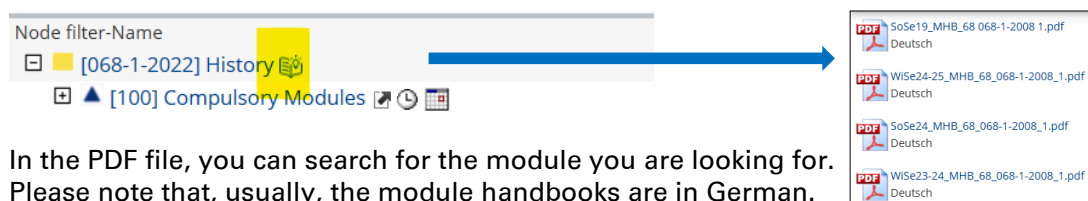
Module handbooks

All of our degree programs have a **module handbook** ("Modulhandbuch"), where all modules related to the program are listed. In general, these are intended for degree-seeking students, but the information about the courses contained within is useful for anyone who wants to study here.

To find the **module handbook**, choose the category: **All Study Programs** and click on the program you are interested in (Bachelor's or Master's program, NO exchange program!).

Then, click on the little book at the end of the lines.

We recommend selecting the module handbook issued in the most recent semester (it contains modules from the winter and the summer semesters):

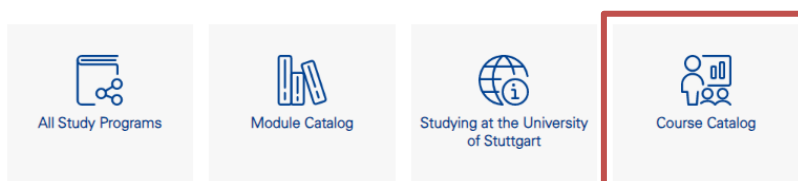


In the PDF file, you can search for the module you are looking for. Please note that, usually, the module handbooks are in German.



"Course catalog"

The second way you may go to find courses is through the category **Course Catalog** ("Angebotene Lehrveranstaltungen"):



a) If you do **not know yet** which courses you want to take, proceed as follows:

In the field **Term**, choose the semester **one year ago** to see courses, which might most probably be offered again once you are in Stuttgart.

S stands for **summer** semesters; **W** stands for **winter** semesters.

In the field **Curriculum**, choose the Bachelor's or Master's **program you assume to find courses that interest you**. Moreover, the drop-down menu contains the corresponding exchange programs (e.g., "Mechanical Engineering, Exchange program").

In the field **Organisation**, you could choose a faculty or institute whose course offerings you are interested in (most organizations are listed), but you can also leave it empty.

On the right-hand side, where it says **Filter**, you may **select the language of instruction**.

b) If you **know the name** of the course or a keyword, use the filter line:

European Credit Transfer System

European Credit Transfer System

At the University of Stuttgart, ECTS credits are usually assigned per module, not per single course!

On C@MPUS, you can see how many ECTS a module gives you in two ways:

1. In the Curriculum overview, the ECTS credits are in the second-to-last column:

2. You can look for the module (e.g., through the name or the number) in the ["Module catalog"](#) section. The module overview gives you the information about the ECTS credits for the module.

Please note: To receive the whole number of credits at the end, students must participate in all the offered teaching typologies belonging to the module.

In the overview of the single courses (which can themselves be part of a bigger module), you may find the indication "semester hours" instead of the course credits. In general, you can infer the ECTS amount from the semester hours in this way:

1 semester hour ("Semesterwochenstunde") = 45 min = 1,5 credits (ECTS)
 A course = usually 2 semester hours = 90 min = 3 credits (ECTS)

If you have any questions or doubts, ask your course lecturer or, as an Erasmus+ student, your academic coordinator!

Course registration

You have to register for your classes within the C@MPUS portal. This is **only possible after application, admission, and enrollment with the university**.

The **period to register** for courses might differ from course to course and would start only some weeks before the semester starts.
